At Bellbrook High School, student-led clubs work together to bring compassion and service to the forefront. These clubs, driven by dedicated students, create a culture of kindness and service, where students are not just taught these values but actively live by them. Bellbrook High School is more than just a place of learning; it's a hub where caring leaders are shaped, making a lasting impact on both the school and the community.

The **Kindness Club** is dedicated to serving the community through monthly activities. In October, the students helped clean and prepare the school garden for winter. They even collaborated with the Art Club to create a beautiful sign for the garden. In November, the Kindness Club organized a food drive to support the Bellbrook Community Center. The students worked hard to collect donations and contribute to the well-being of the community. During December, the students of the Kindness Club made holiday cards for the children at Dayton Children's Hospital, spreading joy and cheer during the holiday season.



The **Hope Squad** is actively involved in raising awareness and promoting suicide prevention. They have almost completed their suicide prevention training. Throughout the school, the squad has placed visual resources to increase mental health awareness and provide access to helpful resources. Recently, Hope Squad organized Hope Week, a series of events culminating in a community fundraising night for suicide prevention during the Bellbrook-Edgewood basketball game. They planned gift basket raffles, prizes, and giveaways to support this important cause. Proceeds were donated directly to NAMI Greene County.



The **BHS GSA** is committed to supporting Daybreak Dayton, the local shelter for homeless youth ages 10 to 21. They organized several donation drives to collect essential items for these vulnerable individuals, making a significant impact on their lives.

The **Key Club** is dedicated to assisting students who rely on free or reduced school breakfasts and lunches. They pack weekend bags filled with essential food items for students who need them. The club also participates in charitable initiatives like Operation Christmas Child and making holiday cards for seniors at Bethany Village Assisted Living.



Supportive Peers recently spread Christmas cheer by hosting a holiday event for students in the district's special education program. The event included crafts, games, a petting zoo, remote controlled cars, and even pictures with Santa. It was a festive and inclusive celebration.

The Bel-Hi Chapter of the **National Honor Society** is made up of 74 members who have completed 5146 hours of community service since June, 2023. These members actively contribute to our school, district, and community. Their support is crucial for events like Halloween in the Park, the Sugar Maple Festival, and the Lions Club SummerFest. They also provide peer tutoring services, volunteering before and after school, as well as during study halls. To be part of the National Honor Society, members must maintain a minimum 3.51 unweighted cumulative GPA. They are not only academic achievers but also serve as positive role models and exhibit strong leadership qualities.

JROTC cadets have already completed over 950 community service hours this semester, and we still have quite a few events going on before we break for the holidays! Cadets started the year helping out at Germanfest in downtown Dayton and the Lion's Club with their annual carnival and parade. Students ran a hydration station at the USAF Marathon, ensuring over 1K runners were properly hydrated for their run. They presented our Nation's Colors at all the home football games, the Lion's Club parade, at the Dayton Honor Flight reunion, and numerous other events around the area. Cadets also supported various Veterans Day events including BCI's annual celebration and a flag-raising at Brookdale Senior Living. They placed flags out for the Avenue of Flags run by the Bellbrook Optimist Club for Labor Day and Veterans Day and helped Boy Scout Troop 375 place 1,600 wreaths on veterans' graves for the holidays. From September to December (the last day was Saturday, Dec 9), cadets conducted a food drive throughout Bellbrook, visiting and collecting non-perishable items in many neighborhoods. More than 8,000 items were collected from Sep 23- Dec 2.

These are just a few examples of the wonderful community service activities taking place at our school. Through the dedicated efforts of student-led clubs, Bellbrook High School has fostered a culture of kindness, awareness, and support. These clubs not only actively engage in service but also empower students to become caring leaders, soaring together to leave a lasting mark on both the school and the Bellbrook-Sugarcreek community. BHS EXAM POLICIES

Exams will be administered at the conclusion of each semester. Exams will be worth 20% of the grade for the semester. A schedule will be provided for students prior to the administering of the tests. Each semester, all students will be awarded one exam exemption that they may use in a single class where they have earned an "A" or "A+" in each quarter of the semester. No "A-" in any quarter in a semester. Students may not exempt the same exam in both semesters. Students may not use an exam exemption in an AP class 1st semester. Students are expected to take their exams on the day and during the period that the exam is scheduled. Exam exemptions apply to BHS courses only, not College Credit Plus courses.

Students will lose the privilege of their exam exemption under the following conditions:

1. A student receives office discipline of: 3+ detentions, in-school studies, or out-of-school suspension during the semester.
2. A student has reached the threshold of Excessively Absent or Habitually Truant by state definitions.

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CLASSROOM AND DEPARTMENTAL NEWS

BHS SCIENCE CLASSES IGNITE CURIOSITY AND CRITICAL THINKING



BHS science classes offer students a dynamic exploration of the natural world. From the microscopic intricacies of cellular processes to the wonders of waves and states of matter, these classes provide a comprehensive understanding of the fundamental principles that govern our universe. Whether students are deciphering the mysteries of chemical bonding, unraveling the secrets of forensic science, or investigating the impact of human activities on Earth's ecosystems, each science class becomes a gateway to curiosity, critical thinking, and hands-on experimentation.

Physical Science students are currently studying waves and the various properties and interactions involved. They will also be exploring the states of matter and how kinetic theory interactions affect our daily lives. The physics portion of their year is coming to an end and they are excited to dive into chemistry in the second semester.

Students have been learning about various processes that cells use to transport materials, including diffusion, osmosis, and active transport in **Essentials of Biology**. They are tasked with identifying characteristics of these processes in real-life examples and conducting experiments to investigate osmosis.

In **Biology** classes, students are learning about cells. They are learning about the different classifications of cells and their characteristics. The chapter involves identifying cell structures, using analogies to understand cell functions, and conducting a lab on osmosis. Students will make predictions, design a portion of the lab, and interpret the results to demonstrate their understanding.

Students in **Chemistry** are delving into the world of moles and practicing dimensional analysis skills to solve basic chemistry problems. They have also been learning how to name and write formulas for chemical compounds. These skills will prepare them for more advanced chemistry topics in the future.

In **Earth and the Environment** class, students have been studying chemical properties related to Earth science. They have learned about the most abundant elements in Earth's atmosphere and crust, as well as states of matter, the periodic table, elements, compounds, and mixtures. This knowledge allows them to understand the chemical processes that occur on Earth's surface and in its atmosphere.

In **PLTW Principles of Biomedical Science**, students have been exploring the science of forensics. They started with a crime scene and will be ending the semester with a forensic autopsy. They have learned about forensic investigation techniques, DNA analysis, heart dissection, and the science of traumatic brain injury.

In **PLTW Human Body Systems**, students have been learning about anatomical terms and body cavities, as well as the function of different tissues in the body. They have also studied muscle contraction and joint mobility. Through hands-on activities, they have explored biomechanical engineering solutions and practiced kinesiology taping techniques.

In **Medical Interventions**, students learned about DNA sequencing and used bioinformatics tools to identify a pathogen responsible for a fictional outbreak. They also performed diagnostic tests and studied antibiotic resistance. Currently, they are studying the ear and its connection to potential side effects of bacterial meningitis.

In **Biomedical Innovation**, students have been researching emergency medicine and designing an emergency room. They have also delved into scientific research methods and statistics, conducting their own experiments and analyzing the results for statistical relevance.

In **CP Physics**, students have been studying momentum and are now preparing to delve into the topics of work and energy. In **Scholarship Physics**, students are mastering centripetal motion and rotational motion, completing their mechanics education.

CLASSROOM AND DEPARTMENTAL NEWS

In **AP Physics**, students have finished the Mechanics portion of the course and are transitioning to the introductory ideas of Electricity and Magnetism, which they find highly fascinating.

AP Chemistry students recently explored chemical bonding while studying vibrant colors. They identified solids and dyed fabrics, and learned about bonding, intermolecular forces, and electronegativity. Through critical thinking and experimentation, they connected theory with real-world applications in a colorful lab experience.

AP Biology students are currently studying cellular division, specifically mitosis and meiosis. They are learning about the steps involved in each process and analyzing the similarities and differences between them. They also conduct lab experiments to observe the impact of fungus on plant cells and study genetic recombination during meiosis.

AP Environmental Science students are focusing on the effects of water and land use on the environment. They are learning about the impact of agriculture, pesticide use, fertilizer use, irrigation, meat production, and overfishing on natural ecosystems. Additionally, they are exploring ways in which humans can mitigate their impact through sustainable use of land and water resources.

As we approach the end of the semester, the journey through the sciences at BHS continues to engage our students, and the skills acquired and the knowledge gained serve as the foundation for future scientific endeavors.

BHS'S DYNAMIC BUSINESS COURSES

Students in **Project-Based-Learning (PBL) Marketing** have been working hard this semester with Mr. Henry Conte, Parent/Community Engagement and Communications Coordinator, to enhance his marketing efforts. Students conducted marketing research during the first quarter and are developing marketing plans to present before Mr. Conte and other key stakeholders before the holiday break.

Students in **Supply Chain Management**, a College Credit Plus Course taught by Mr. Craig, have experienced hands-on activities, guest speakers, and a field trip this semester. Recently students visited the GeoSpatial Advanced Manufacturing Facility in Springfield. SelectTech GeoSpatial is a defense contractor that specializes in airborne satellite communications, aircraft modifications, rugged and airborne electronic enclosures, kitting and integration, ground and communications shelters, roll-on/roll-off aircraft shelters, cables and harnesses, and unmanned aerial systems (UAS). Students learned about the Supply Chain Management and business issues faced by SelectTech.

In **Computer Essentials**, Students have been learning how to create videos using WeVideo. Students recently completed their How-to videos where they were filmed showing the class how to make a PB&J sandwich, tie their shoes or how to play chess. They are currently working on creating a highlight video featuring them in a sport or places they've been on vacation.



The advertising campaign for their new brand of orange juice, Florida Gold has been the most recent focus for **Business Foundations** Students. They have created a slogan, logo, label, advertisements and promotions, and a storyboard for their commercial. They will present their campaign to the class with a persuasive argument as to why their campaign should be picked to rebrand the orange juice product.

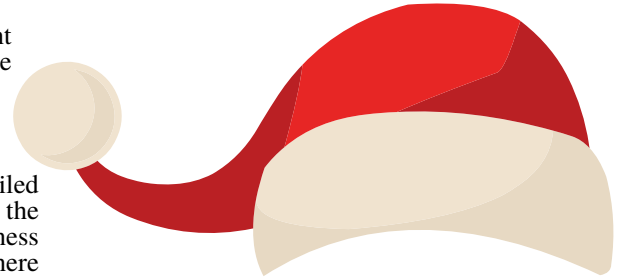

PE Waivers

A list of students who earned a PE waiver from Fall sports was sent to the counseling office from the athletic department. As a reminder, the PE waiver is available to students in grades 9-12 participating in BHS Interscholastic Sports, Cheerleading, the Marching Band and JROTC. Students must successfully complete 2 full-seasons in one or more qualifying activities from the same area (ie: cannot mix 1 year of JROTC and 1 season of a sport). Once completed, the two PE waivers will waive the PE graduation requirement. The PE waiver does not count for a credit and the grade is marked as a "P". Students cannot mix a PE class and a PE waiver.
