

Dr. Pryor was elected to the school board in November. She replaces David Carpenter who chose not to run. Thanks to Mr. Carpenter for his eight years of service to our district! Dr. Pryor and her husband Jonothan have lived in the Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Area since 2005, and have one child who graduated from BHS and two who are currently in our schools. We welcome her to the school board.

As we celebrate these accomplishments, milestones and introductions, let's now turn our attention to the strategic direction that will shape the future of Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Schools. "Better Today than Yesterday, Better Tomorrow than Today" is the new Vision Statement of Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Schools as the Board of Education formally adopted the District Goals and its vision and mission statements during the October 12, 2023 meeting. In addition to the goals and vision, its new mission statement is: At Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Schools we will: Do the Right Thing, Soar Together, and Pursue Excellence. The District Goals focus on four areas: Culture and Climate, Systems and Processes, Facilities, and Finances.

Our focus on Climate and Culture revolves around "Focus 3," a framework fostering a positive mindset and building a positive culture throughout the district. Aligned with our mission, this initiative underscores that everyone plays a crucial role in shaping a positive culture, utilizing tools such as Focus 3 principles like E+R=O (Event + Response = Outcome) and our own Culture Playbook, found on our website.

The second part of the Climate and Culture goal seeks to integrate the "Artisan Teacher" instructional coaching principles into our classrooms. This approach empowers

teachers to identify, hone, and complement their skills, building on their strengths and enhancing the overall quality of instruction. This coaching is completed by our principals and teachers.

The second goal introduces Implementation Science research principles, strategically designed to ensure the success of our initiatives. By proactively documenting and planning for effective implementation, we will establish a robust framework to guide our systems, processes, and programs toward long-term success.

Facilities take the spotlight in our third goal, emphasizing responsible planning for the future needs of our school district. A comprehensive seven-year Master Facilities and Grounds Plan will guide decisions on replacing, repairing, building, or divesting infrastructure, with community input playing a pivotal role. We've already committed to replacing our turf field and track this summer.

Finally, fiscal responsibility is our fourth goal, affirming our commitment to maintaining a proactive stance within current and projected funding confines. This holistic approach extends across all aspects of operations and management, ensuring financial stability and sustainability.

We take pride in our district being one of only eight school districts in Ohio to earn five stars overall and in each category on the 2022-23 State Report Card. These goals are an example of our commitment to live out our new district vision statement of "Better Today than Yesterday, Better Tomorrow than Today" in order to provide the best learning experience for our students and working environment for our staff. 
Heidi Anderson - BOF Member


District Introduces New Transportation Technology

As technology continues to develop throughout the educational landscape, the Bellbrook-Sugarcreek School District is using it to assist its employees and district families where it makes sense.

One of those places is the new Stopfinder App, which family members can install to help keep track of student pickup and

drop-off times, bus stop locations and bus numbers.

The benefits of the new app are numerous, but the reason for the change is easy. In simple terms, where the district houses its information for students -FinalForms – and the old bus routing system didn't communicate well with one another. Full student information lists had to be downloaded from one system and uploaded into another. With Stopfinder that will now be a thing of the past.



A major benefit of this new technology is being able to communicate – one-way – with families of riders on a certain bus. For example, if Bus 45 is running late to BCI because of a blown tire, Transportation Supervisor Lori Smith can send a message to just those families and let them know what is happening and what the next steps are so families aren't burdened with unnecessary information.

"In an effort to protect student data and create continuity, we needed a product that would exchange data seamlessly and safely," Smith said. "This system will house all the routing

Make Sure...

Transportation contact information, email and phone numbers need to be checked/updated now that the Stopfinder App is available. The information in FinalForms is what the District relies on for parent contact information.

Step 1: Update all contact information in FinalForms for each student by Feb. 5.

Step 2: You will receive an invite to Stopfinder to verify your information. You can't get to Step 2 without completing Step 1.

information - bus stops, times, parent contact info, transportation contacts (who can pick up students and how to get a hold of parents if there's a problem at a stop) and it gives me a tool to contact the parents in the moment versus having to go through a process that is more general and contacts everyone."

Not everyone has access to the Stopfinder App, though. Only those who are listed in FinalForms as the first two parents/guardians will be able to see the information available

for students. The main family member contacts in FinalForms control who can access their student's bus information through an invitation after their information is completed in Stopfinder.

PTO Introducing Fill the Nest Campaign

The Sugarcreek Parent-Teacher Organization is a volunteer organization that maintains a close working relationship between parents, teachers/staff and students to enhance the educational experience by supporting the students and teaching staff through fundraising efforts. This provides additional equipment, technology, educational resources and educational services, and special projects.

A strong PTO is evidence of community interest/support and ensures a better school environment for all students.

The PTO always is seeking more active members ... and it doesn't only have to be parents of current students. Anyone in the community who is interested is welcome to join.

"We are always looking for volunteers for activities and events," PTO president Tina Hileman said. "Our hope as a functioning PTO is to be the staff and teachers' ally when it comes to curricular and fundraising goals."

Volunteering and participating in the various fundraisers throughout the school year is a great way to help the PTO. This year, the PTO will introduce a change to the Direct Donation Campaign, called Fill the Nest. Fill the Nest will officially begin in February, so watch for details on the PTO facebook page. Every bit of support counts and helps the PTO purchase needed technology, educational materials, classroom supplies,



field trips and more. All profits go to benefit the students of our award-winning school district.

The success of Fill the Nest can significantly reduce the number of small fundraising activities throughout the school year.





Meyer Sets Record, Scohy Hits Milestone

When Alayna Meyer and Taylor Scohy took the floor for the first time as freshmen, you might not have thought it was a big deal. into play. The already two-time SWBL Player of the Year scored the 1,000th point of her career in the first quarter of her Dec. 14 game against Ross.

Two freshmen on the floor for a varsity team happens. But when it happens at a storied program like Bellbrook's, you might want to pay attention.

Indeed, they both earned their way onto the floor and have made the most of their opportunities. This past December were some of the most notable.

In a win over Monroe on Dec. 7, Alayna

Meyer earned the title of the top 3-point shooter in Bellbrook girls basketball history, hitting her 146th to top Bailey Zerby in the record books.

"People kept asking me like, at school, like my teachers and even my assistant coach, a couple of my teammates were like, oh, is it gonna be the night?" Meyer said. "I didn't know exactly what the number was, how many I had to get or like, even when it happened – I didn't know it happened. But after the game, everyone told me you got it."

"It's just been really cool. I've had like the same group of people basically since my freshman year," Scohy said. "I've been with the same group. So everyone's just so supportive and everyone, like every time I get like a new accomplishment all my coaches and teammates are so happy about it. So, it's just good to have support and feel loved."

Jason Tincher, who has a record of 64-13 with

Meyer and Scohy on his squad, has been the beneficiary of their talent and hard work.

"I love that kid," Tincher said of Meyer. "She is the sweetest person, but there's a staunch competitor on the floor. She just wants to compete at the highest level. She's the greatest teammate, she's one of the hardest workers and she's one of our best players. So that combination is just a great thing."


And the sentiments are the same when he speaks about Scohy.

Bell Creek Intermediate Sensory Room Gets Important Facelift

In the vibrant setting of Bell Creek Intermediate, the commitment to nurturing every student's unique needs is exemplified through the integration of a recently repurposed and re-created sensory, calming room.

These specialized spaces have become a vital component of the school's approach to education, providing a sanctuary for students to: support diverse learning styles, manage sensory overload, reduce stress, enhance their overall well-being, and embrace inclusivity.

At Bell Creek Intermediate, the essence of supporting diverse learning styles is encapsulated in the school's dedicated sensory calming room. Understanding that each student has a unique approach to learning, the room offers an adaptive environment where students can regulate their sensory experiences, ensuring a more equitable and personalized educational journey.

For some students, the demands of academic and social interactions can be particularly challenging, and BCI recognizes this as a reality. The school's commitment to stress reduction is manifested through its sensory calming space, providing a haven where children who need to regroup or refocus can escape external stimuli, foster emotional well-being, and create a conducive atmosphere for themselves upon returning to the learning environment.

The room provides a safe space where students can begin to process their thoughts and emotions on their way to self-regulation. The space serves to benefit students with numerous sensory obstacles, not to mention students succeeding with ADHD, autism spectrum disorder, and other differently-abled needs. The sensory room comes equipped with suspended swings for vestibular input, exercise balls for bouncing, tactile stimulation, calming bubble tubes, stress balls, wall art in soothing colors, bean bags, floor cushions, rocking chairs, cozy weighted blankets, textured mats, two interactive sensory boards, interactive sensory lights and table, tactile or pressure-sensitive mats, soft muted paint on the walls, tangle toys, fidget spinners, and squeeze toys and a host of other sensory tools. Bell Creek's adoption of sensory space aligns seamlessly with its commitment to inclusive education.

BCI stands as a beacon of progressive education by committing to providing a holistic education and fostering a positive and nurturing learning environment for every child in its building community.

So what's the first step? Make sure all your contact information is updated in FinalForms.

Similar to Remind, FinalForms is where the district draws the contact information from. Once the information is correct, the main contact for the families will receive an invitation via email to download the Stopfinder App and create an account with the email provided in FinalForms. Your students' information should automatically filter in after a few more steps, and then you can pick your preferences on how you receive updates, whether it's through the Stopfinder App, texts or emails. Pick one, two or all ways, it's up to you!

There are videos available, just in case you are having trouble getting your preferences just the way you want them. Scan the QR Code below to access them.

"If families see inaccurate information in the Stopfinder App, they absolutely need to let us know so we can get it corrected," Smith said. "We can't correct what we don't know about.

We've got over 3,100 transportation requests. About 1,500 students who are transported by bus, so we need the help of families to let us know if something there isn't quite right."



The system has been used in the background for a while now, so in theory, the routing information should be largely accurate.

It should be noted, per the guidance from the Department of Homeland Security, the district will not enable the GPS tracking feature of buses, when students have been dropped off, or the current locations of buses. Very few districts, if any in our area, provide the GPS information of buses to families.

Lions Club, Board Take Step Forward on EagleLand 2

It was a 5-0 vote. An easy one, really. But that 5-0 vote was a huge symbolic step toward EagleLand 2 coming to fruition.

The Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Board of Education agreed to a Memorandum of Understanding with the Bellbrook Lions Club at the December 14 meeting, which will give control of the playground area of the property between Bell Creek Intermediate and the St. Pierre Board of Education Building to the Lions Club so it can begin work on the new accessible playground.

According to drawings, the updated playground will have at least three new attractions, including the We Go Round, the Zip Krooz and the Quantis. The Lions Club also will "square off" the area to the west side of the playground, adding more room and moving and updating the swing set. One of the bigger parts of the project is the turf that will be installed, making the newer pieces as well as the swings, accessible by wheelchair.

Gregg Sparks gave a presentation and overview to the board on Dec. 14 before the MOU was agreed upon, showing images and videos of the new attractions.

The entire project started thanks to the inclusiveness shown by several third graders in Mrs. Culler's class. As part of a Project-Based Learning assignment, Culler told her class

to think of a real-world problem and to find ways to solve it. Their problem? Some of their friends with disabilities couldn't access areas of the playground.

The project wasn't just "find a problem." They needed to actively work to fix it. The next step was to write a friendly letter asking for a change.

That letter went to Principal Donnie Phelps, who responded that while the project was worthwhile, the district simply couldn't afford to fix it.

The students would have to take it a step further. And so they did, heading to the Lions Club Pancake Breakfast in February 2023. There, they shared their idea with the Lions Club in a Shark-Tank-like presentation to solicit funds to build a more inclusive playground space.

"It was amazing to see them with a seed of hope, to see that turn into something beyond their wildest dreams," Phelps said.

They showed up, gave a presentation and showed a video pleading their case while also holding signs and speaking eloquently on behalf of their friends. Thankfully, the Lions Club responded with a big pledge and has now taken it a step further, entering into the agreement with the district.

everybody's best player and she's our best scorer. She's another kid who wins every sprint. That's the example for the team. Everybody follows that. They're going to do whatever Taylor does and Taylor is no-nonsense when it comes to practice. She is focused and she wants to be the best at what she does."

The stats back that up. If you just look at scoring, Scohy put up 159 points as a freshman, 373 as a sophomore and 400 last year. She has already posted 64 this season – including 25 vs. Monroe. Her career high was 29 points at Waynesville last season. As a junior she averaged three steals, nearly three assists and five rebounds to go with her nearly 17 points per game.

Meyer currently has 147 career 3s, including seven so far this season. She hit 62 as a sophomore and 54 as a junior and averages about 10 points a game. Her career highs came against Ursuline Academy as a sophomore when she scored 29 points and hit seven 3s in a single game.
