# SUPERINTENDENT

Dear District Residents,

These past months have certainly been extremely unique and challenging as we have battled through the COVID-19 pandemic. There was an overnight change in how we live every facet of our lives, impacting everything as small as a handshake or a hug as well as going to a store, visiting our friends and family and, of course, how we go to school. It has certainly been a test in patience, flexibility and collaboration.

I believe that our district was as well-prepared as any for this situation. On the afternoon of Thursday, March 12, the state announced that all PK-12 school buildings would be closed and that we would be moving to remote learning until at least April 6 (later it was extended to the rest of the school year). By Tuesday, March 17, we were up and running with remote learning using Google Classroom - an extremely quick turn-around!

Because we had experience using Classroom and other digital tools for the past few years, we were as digitally prepared for this transition as we could be. Google Classroom allows teachers a medium in which to post assignments, assessments and other pertinent information. We are also using the video conferencing tool Google Meet and a screen recording software called Screencastify to provide our students with lessons, social and connection time, meetings with counselors and teachers, and collaborative sessions between not only students but with staff.


Of course, we can always get better and always strive to do so, which is why we surveyed our students, parents and staff in May asking questions such as "What went well and what could go better next time?" Additionally, we asked questions about next school year. We will use all of this information to prepare for next school year so that we can continue to provide a high level, student-centered experience for our students, regardless of whether students are back in the classroom 100% of the time, 100% remote learning, or a blended approach.

# Financial Update

The financial situation of Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Schools continues to be the single most important issue facing our school district. Without our finances on solid ground, it is extremely difficult to offer the type of well-rounded education our students deserve. With the disappointing failure of the March levy - combined with the staggering \$659,000 reduction in state funding (since reduced to \$517,000) for this school year announced after the due date of absentee ballots to be returned - the district's budget is at an even more perilous situation.

Due to the district's financial situation and the uncertainty of what the next school year will look like, district leadership has taken on the heavy task of examining every personnel decision to keep expenses to a minimum, while constantly looking for ways to seek efficiencies.

For example, the Board had considered suspending the All Day Every Day (ADED) Kindergarten program for the 2020-21 school year due to a current lack of enrollment, the uncertainty of additional enrollees for next school year due to the COVID-19 concerns, and the likely situation that kindergarten tuition would have to be reimbursed if a switch to remote learning is made during the school year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Suspending ADED Kindergarten could also result in future repercussions to district enrollment. While even thinking about this saddens me, we have to explore every option for cost savings and possible revenue losses. After much consideration, it has been decided to continue the All Day Every Day (ADED) Kindergarten program for the 2020-21 school year.

The Phase III and IV reductions include 13 staff positions that the district eliminated due to the levy failure and in light of current district finances. This adds to the number of positions that have been reduced in the district since 2018 to 33, which is about 10% of district staff. Further, 85 supplemental positions had to be eliminated resulting in

losses impacting sports teams, middle school play, Math Pentathlon, high school clubs, and Pep Band.

Let's reiterate this - these are not easy decisions to make. The fiscal reality however, is that we simply cannot continue to make reductions without seriously impacting the quality of our students' educational experience, and unfortunately, that is where we are right now. The updated five-year forecast, which was presented to the board in May, shows that with this most recent levy failure, the district will be making \$2.5 million in cumulative reductions for school years 2020-21 and 2021-22. The forecast also takes into account the almost \$1.3 million in state funding reductions for 2019-20 and anticipated in 2020-21. To summarize the district's financial situation over the new few years as it stands right now, the ending balance for the 2021-22 school year is \$414,198, for the 2022-23 school year it is **-\$2,738,581** and for the 2023-24 year it is **-\$7,175,606**.

The Board is also discussing possible options for putting a levy on the November ballot. These discussions and decisions will take place this summer. Believe us when we say that we are doing everything we can to have the least detrimental impact on the high-quality educational experience that our children deserve, but we are to the point where we cannot help but feel these cuts and reductions in the classroom and beyond. And as you can see from the information above, there is no way we can continue to operate our school district without additional local funding.

Earlier in the year the Auditor of State's Ohio Performance Team (OPT) conducted a performance audit of the Bellbrook-Sugarcreek School District. Due to an already lean budget, the auditors found it very challenging to find many areas to reduce without striking at the core of our schools and forever changing the well-rounded and high-caliber educational experience that our students deserve and our community expects. Unfortunately, with the levy failure and reductions from the state, these types of reductions are becoming a reality for our school district.

# Golden Eagles Soar into Remote Learning

On March 12, 2020, Governor Mike DeWine made an unprecedented announcement ordering all of Ohio's public, community and private K-12 school buildings to be closed due to the coronavirus pandemic.

At that time, we knew that the traditional spring plans of students, teachers, and families would be turned upside down. With little time to plan, anticipate roadblocks, or have preparation-centered discussions with students, Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Schools unveiled its educational response for remote learning.

Remote learning requires use of online programs that connect teachers with students as well as the organization of instructional objectives, schedules, and parent communication. Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Schools has employed one-to-one technology since 2015, when students in grades 6-12 were assigned a Chromebook (personal computing devices) for school use. Since then, the one-to-one initiative expanded to elementary grades as well. On March 13, Chromebooks were sent home with all students in grades K-12, and although the district was prepared, no one could have predicted that that would be the last day of traditional face-to-face school this school year.

To make the remote learning experience as successful as possible, Bellbrook teachers followed a coordinated schedule to balance student workloads, provide time for parent-teacher communication, and allow critical staff collaboration. Teachers met online by grade or subject area at least once a week to plan for and communicate about student needs. Building principals and district administrators held virtual meetings with staff each week as well.

Although studies have shown that instructional planning for an online environment is significantly more intensive than for traditional face-to-face teaching, there have been some positives that have come from this situation. Meeting online has opened up opportunities for teachers to plan with each other without traditional school schedule constraints. Added to that, many teachers are collaborating across grade levels and buildings, which is difficult to accomplish during traditional face-to-face education.



## Join Us for our Inaugural Community Literary Initiative

One example of a district-wide online experience is a community-wide effort known as "BellBOOKS: Taking Root 2020." Early this school year, second-grade teachers began planning a grade-level reading of the Katherine Applegate novel, *Wishtree*. When their plans came to a halt due to the school closure, they were motivated to adjust and expand their efforts across the entire school community.



Teachers across grade levels began meeting online to develop a district-wide literacy effort, which included incorporating *Wishtree* discussions and projects in their virtual classrooms. Fifty-one teachers and administrators recorded chapter readings in both English and Spanish for students to listen to at home with their families. These videos are posted on the district *Wishtree* website available for anyone to view. Join us through the QR code.

In the words of Donnie Phelps, Bellbrook High School English and Spanish teacher, "This will be a great way to promote connection, albeit virtual, to a common reading experience and to see this book touch the lives of all of our Bellbrook Golden Eagles!"

# Bellbrook High School Teacher Creates 3-D Mask Extenders for the Community

Upon hearing of the urgent need for medical supplies during the pandemic, Blake Barnes, civil engineering/architecture teacher at Bellbrook High School, found an open source design for mask extenders and, with permission from principal Dave Hann, used the school’s 3-D printer to make them.

“Wearing a mask periodically is usually a non-issue for most people, but for those who need to wear them hour after hour, day after day, the pain and pressure on the ears can be pretty awful,” said Barnes. “The extenders are designed to help eliminate that pain, and from what I have heard from the community, they work.”

The extender functions by hooking to the elastic of a mask and wrapping around the back of the head/neck. Barnes has printed extenders for doctors, nurses, pharmacy workers, nursing home employees, the Bellbrook Police Department, school staff serving lunch to students each day, and many others. He estimates having distributed around 150 extenders.

Recently, four engineering students - Allie Lewis, Lucas Smallwood, Glenn Ochsner and Cambree Bernkopf - volunteered to continue the work from their homes over the summer while Barnes cares for his new baby. The students will use 3-D pen kits to maintain production. In addition, Barnes was able to create a similar mask extender design using the school’s laser cutter/engraver, which produces at a much faster rate.
